#### Raising awareness of Motor Neurone Disease - A date with Mark O'Brien



Did you really just do that, Dad?

Many of you will know Mark O'Brien, a good friend of Herts Tennis who captains the Men's first teams at Rickmansworth and has represented the club in over 500 matches. Tragically, Mark has been diagnosed with Motor Neurone Disease (MND), a terminal condition that impacts the brain, nerves, and muscles and eventually leads to respiratory failure.

Now, as those of you who have played with or against him will testify, Mark is blessed with an abundance of spirit and determination. So, let's just say he was never going to lie down and call it quits. Oh no. Instead, he decided to take on a frankly unbelievable challenge, by attempting to break the World Record for the longest ever unaided open water swim for a person living with the condition. The distance? Well, his supporters turned up at Denham Lake last Sunday expecting it to be an already crazy 10.5km, then Mark announced live on BBC TV just before the swim that he was going to do an extra 500m. The editor has forbidden me from repeating what his Mum and Sister thought about that!

How did the record attempt go? The water was cold, there were horribly strong cross winds, Mark pulled his groin after just 4km which meant that for most of the swim he was using just one leg.....oh and he had hyperthermia at the end. Apart from that, brilliantly! This quite amazing man smashed the record, swimming for a whopping 5 hours 23 minutes and in an emotional finish, was joined by his wonderful children, Lauren, David and Georgia for the last 1.5km. What can I say. It was incredible.

I want to bring in Mark now to explain why the challenge was so important to him.

"Whilst I was a little late in life to tennis, it became a huge part of my life. I have loved visiting all the clubs in the county either as a player, captain or spectator. Although I cannot compete any more, it is still a privilege to be involved in tennis with the various first teams at Rickmansworth. I am immensely grateful for what life has given me and I actually feel really lucky to have experienced so many wonderful memories. Without being too morbid, this is my last swan song as far as sport is concerned and I would be incredibly grateful for any support you are able to offer.

My motivation for this challenge is:

- 1. To raise awareness of MND on a national and global basis
- 2. To help and inspire other people living with MND to know that 'even the impossible can be possible.'
- 3. To raise funds for the MND Association, who support families impacted by MND
- 4. To raise funds for continued MND research to find a cure for MND
- 5. To leave my children, family, and friends with lifelong memories"

### Going places with Ivan Deb

18-year-old Ivan Rodriguez Deb is the three-time national Men's champion in visually-impaired tennis and the youngest member of the GB squad. He was selected to represent Great Britain during the pandemic but missed the opportunity of going to the World Championships in 2020 as a result of the lockdown.

This summer however, he represented GB at both the IBSA World Games in Birmingham (the largest international event for elite visually impaired athletes in the world), where he won silver in the Men's singles and bronze in the Men's doubles, and at the International Blind Tennis World Championships in Krakow, Poland, where he once again took the silver medal.

Ivan has achieved all this with the support of his coach Paul Seymour, Racquets Manager at David Lloyd Northwood and his local club, West Herts and Watford LTC. Both clubs have kindly given Ivan access to their facilities to train which has been key to his success. The difference perhaps with Ivan's story is that both clubs are keen to support the idea that a visually impaired tennis player needs to train in the same way and with the same dedication and physical and mental discipline as any able-bodied player.

But there is a big difference in terms of funding available. There is, as yet, no prize money in visually impaired tennis (something that Ivan hopes will also change one day) and what makes Ivan's achievement even more incredible is that he paid to go to Poland himself, without having the funds to pay for his coach or a team to technically and emotionally support him at the competition, unlike players from the other countries in his category.

The aim is now to raise awareness and funds so that Ivan can return to the World Championships next year equipped with the resources that will help him bring back gold. For St Albans it's their 2nd title on the bounce, having only ever previously won the event once in the competition's 75 year history, while Welwyn have won for the 4th time out of the last 6 competitions played.

In the Men's competition, Welwyn will be joined by two teams with vastly different Herts League pedigree next year, Elliswick and Rickmansworth, in what promises to be an exciting Championship Division. Although Rickmansworth have not sat at the top table for a long time and even dropped out of the league for a few years in 2016, they are former winners of the competition (in 1996 and 1998), whereas for Elliswick this is a historic moment. That showed magnificently when what must be the biggest crowd ever seen for a Herts League match turned out at the club in September for a crunch promotion decider against West Herts. As a West Herts member it was not easy being a neutral that day, but there's no doubt the better team won…and at least the vast majority of the huge crowd (all bar one) went home happy!

## Safeguarding and Welfare Officer Update



The 2023/2024 Venue Registration window has come around again and all Chairs will have received a link to a video guide on the venue portal to check if the current standards are met; there are no major changes this year.

County Safeguarding and Venue Welfare Officers have been given the opportunity to provide input into the new LTA Safeguarding Strategy which is likely to better recognise the importance of the role and provide additional support.

The new Safeguarding Awareness Week in October has proved popular, with many of the practical sessions becoming fully booked. You can still sign up to Izzey's Story, a real-life scenario developed by the University of Kent in conjunction with the LTA, volunteers, coaches and young people, which examines the dynamics of grooming and sexual abuse. Completing this will add one year to your existing basic safeguarding training.

Following the pilot of a couple of daytime Welfare Officer Networking Events earlier in the year, our grateful thanks to Elliswick for hosting an evening session in September, which Melissa Miller, our Regional Safeguarding Officer, was able to attend and then pass on invaluable feedback to the LTA Central Safeguarding Team. More offers to host are welcomed!

The LTA and Herts Tennis safeguarding pages are a useful signpost to information, policies and procedures, but please always feel free to approach me for guidance and advice; I will usually be able to respond to an email the same day!
