Sport for Good at Orchard Tennis Club

In October Orchard Tennis Club was delighted to hold its 13th Annual Charity Tournament in memory of popular member Stuart West. This year the nominated charity was Herts Young Homeless which provides support to 16 to 24 year olds who are homeless or threatened with homelessness in Hertfordshire.

The day opened with an amusing and informative address from the High Sheriff of Hertfordshire, Annie Brewster, emphasising the role of sport in helping the community, followed by an introduction to HYH from Nicola McKinnon who highlighted the problems faced by homeless young people and the services provided by HYH, ranging from early intervention to crisis support. Also present were the Mayor of Welwyn Hatfield, Councillor Frank Marsh, his predecessor Councillor Pankit Shah and Councillor Leo Gilbert.

Four teams, captained by Stuart's widow Sue and his children James and Danielle, and by Adam Reid, competed for the Stuart West Trophy in a mixed doubles handicap event arranged by Club President, Dave Wesson. Each team played a total of 12 matches. At the end of the competition, James West's team proved victorious by a small margin, demonstrating the accuracy of the handicaps. Refreshment stalls and a barbecue enabled the players to sustain their energy and the quality of tennis throughout the day.

Club President Dave Wesson commented "We were lucky with the weather and an enjoyable day of tennis was had by all. The activities and generous donations from our members and guests enabled our Charity Day to raise a fantastic amount of £800 for the excellent charity Herts Young Homeless".



An epic weekend at the Winter County Cup

Our Winter County Cup teams had a superb weekend at the end of November. Our men became WCC champions and our ladies won their group and will be playing in Group 1 next year.

Playing in Group 1 in Bath, our men started their campaign on Day 1 with a 7-2 win over Essex. Townsend and Welwyn triumph at this year's Harris Cup Finals

An enthusiastic crowd braved all the elements and were treated to some superb tennis when Codicote LTC hosted the finals of this year's Harris Cup Men's and Ladies competition in mid October. Named in honour of two of the County's greatest ever servants to tennis, John and Val Harris, the Harris Cup is the county's prestigious 2 pair knockout cup event.

The Ladies final was a repeat of last year's and as in 2023 it was Townsend who came out on top in an exciting clash with St Albans to take the trophy home for the third year in a row and in so doing become the most successful Ladies Harris Cup team ever.

St Albans' quality would have been too much for most opposition, but this Townsend team has been producing tennis of the highest quality for several years now and seems to thrive under the competition's two pair format.

The Men's final pitted last year's winners, Rickmansworth, against a star studded Welwyn team which featured local lads Max and Sam Howard. Once again the tennis didn't disappoint and in a gripping match which swung one way then the other, the result was in the balance right up until the final few games.

It was Welwyn who eventually managed to get their hands on the trophy though and who followed the Townsend Ladies in becoming the competition's most successful Men's team.

Huge thanks to all four teams for treating the plucky spectators to some scintillating tennis and to everybody at Codicote for being such welcoming hosts.

How and when did you first get involved with Herts Tennis?

I've always volunteered on club committees but I can clearly remember a conversation with Janet Corrie where she "encouraged' me to get involved with the county. I started on a working group with the brilliant Jenny Thomas promoting our women and girls in tennis opportunities, a cause that's still dear to my heart. I think that was a few years before I joined the management committee in 2016.

My tennis journey was inspired by being a ball kid for Bjorn Borg and Vitas Gerulaitis when they used to do their pre-Wimbledon practicing at the Cumberland club. I was a star-struck kid!

There are loads of people I enjoy playing against both at Harpenden and in the wider county leagues – but we always get a nice match tea at Moor Park!

Least favourite opponent?

Although I love her dearly, playing against my Godmother was always really tough. She was my first tennis coach and knew exactly how to wind me up on a court.

I still ski (just!) and regularly attend yoga classes. Have had a few goes at padel so far and tempted to do more...

Safeguarding and Welfare Officer Update



What's new in Safeguarding and Inclusion?

Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI)

Building a culture of inclusion and driving greater diversity across tennis is everyone's responsibility and Herts Tennis have developed a 3 year plan designed to make tennis look and feel more opened up through more inclusive leadership, governance and behaviours.

The LTA has updated the EDI policy for venues with effect from 1st December 2024 and this sets out what members can expect from you and hold you to account against, in the way you operate on a day to day basis.

Whilst many defibrillators self-test on a regular basis, the need to replace expired batteries or pads can be missed and not picked up until the machine is needed and is effectively unusable which can have serious consequences.
