President's Report



Welcome to what is my final report as President of Herts Tennis, but perhaps more significantly as a member of the county's Management Committee, which has felt like a second home for me now for quite some time. Oh and I know what you're thinking, I should have been kicked out of this particular home a long time ago!

Now clearly this being my last report doesn't mean I can get away with writing any old nonsense, but I think it at least gives me a bit of leeway to venture a little off the beaten track. That doesn't mean I'm going to go completely off-piste - I'm a blue run kind of guy - but I would like to take the opportunity, which leaving something behind that's been a big part of your life affords, of reflecting on some of the changes I've seen in that time and remembering some of the people who have left their mark, not just on me but also on this wonderful game of ours and how it has developed in the county. Let's begin with some of the changes. Well, for starters the whole outlook surrounding tennis has changed. From the world of county tennis, I shall never forget the impact the one and only Jeff Wayne had on the Men's team when he began his...wait for it... ridiculously successful 35 years in charge! Incredibly and no doubt inspired by that, our Ladies have somehow matched that success, led to glory first by Sarah Donovan, then Alissa

Ayling and latterly Amanda Elliott. An amazing 27 national titles have come the county's way under the captaincy of these four Herts legends!

Success like that doesn't just happen and the groundwork for it was set a long time ago now by two people with Herts blood running through their veins, Martin and Janet Corrie, when they developed the master plan which created the

Speaking of visits, we have always received such warm welcomes wherever we go, which has made them a real highlight for me. Special thanks to Oxhey Hall, Leverstock Green, Codicote, Elliswick, St Albans, Croxley Green, Barnet, Rickmansworth, and Townsend among others (remember, the memory's not great) for welcoming us this year with such open arms...and minds!

Each year amazing achievements and contributions that are being made by wonderful people at a venue just like yours are recognised through the LTA's national Tennis Awards scheme and our county event gives us a golden opportunity to say thank you to members of the Herts family, young and old, our clubs, coaches, officials and more for their contributions as well as a chance to recognise some outstanding achievements.

Which leads me to my final final ask of you (I said I'd get a bit more leeway!). Please do something to recognise any unsung heroes at your venue. You can do it locally and that is a fantastic thing to do – people at your venue hearing what great things others are getting up to for their benefit will often inspire them to get more involved themselves – but you can also nominate somebody deserving of recognition under the LTA's scheme. You may have done it (or tried to do it) in the past when, frankly, the process was painful. I promise you things have improved though and it will genuinely only take up a short amount of your time these days. We'd love you to do that because the county would like to say thank you too but we can't do it if we don't hear about them!

As you have come to expect, the Newsletter covers the highlights from the last year beautifully, but I can't leave you without mentioning one or two.

In July, our record breaking Ladies county team won the national title again, which means they have won a frankly unbelievable five successive Summer County Cups! There's nothing better than watching our teams battle it out on the lush grass courts of Devonshire Park in the summer sunshine, especially when they're so good. Come on down and cheer them on. The ice creams are on me!

If you can't make that but might be free on the last weekend in November, Bath is the place to be for some similarly amazing indoor tennis at the Winter County Cup. Our Men's team will be looking to defend the title they somehow managed to win in November after what had been a 7 year gap. Our Ladies team will be there as well this year after a fabulous last promotion campaign and in the evening the town looks beautiful in the run up to Christmas.

Those results plus those of our fantastic junior and seniors teams during the year, which included a national title for our 18U Girls team and a win at the Lionel Cox event for our younger players, saw us to 4th place in the overall National County Cup race. When you consider some of the counties we're up against, that's a superb performance. Huge congratulations to everybody who played their part.

Our wonderful visually impaired player, Ivan Rodriguez Deb, added a Wimbledon title to yet another triumph at the National Championships in what was another unbelievably successful year for him.

For the first year ever we held two County Championships, with wonderful Rickmansworth playing host to the finals of the tennis event for the 6th consecutive year and the finals of the



inaugural padel event held on Bishop's Stortford's lovely new courts.

The 76th Herts League titles were won by Gosling's Ladies and Harpenden's Men, while the Welwyn Men and Townsend Ladies were crowned Harris Cup Champions at the finals day hosted by Codicote.

Our Herts Tennis Foundation, which covers our community outreach, Open Court and Schools work, goes from strength to strength under the brilliant watch of Phil Martin and Marion Stevenson amongst others. If your venue would like to work with us to open tennis up to your local community, we'd love to hear from you. Get in touch with the county office, where you'll find all the support you need.

Huge thanks to everybody involved in the county's schools network, where we continue to be so indebted to the wonderful Pam Burrage. What is always a massive team effort has involved supporting the Schools Games Finals and the County Sports partnership's annual PE Conference, where many children gain their first experience of playing the game.

A big thank you also to Alison Allard for overseeing the Herts

Tennis Coaches Forum group, which runs some fantastic coach education courses and co-hosts a number of Coach Forums and Female Workforce networking events.

Not for the first time, the young people on our Futures programme, which looks to give juniors in Year 10 and above experiences of all aspects of the game, have been so impressive. I see them at the County Championships, where they help the organisers and officials out and set the players a fantastic example by demonstrating the values the county holds dear. A huge thank you to our wonderful Performance Manager, Teresa Lilley, for the major role she plays in that.

My final thank you is to our Partners for their wonderful support, which is so important in helping us develop the sport in the county.

Ok...I know...enough's enough! Let me tear myself away and leave you to enjoy the Newsletter in the very capable hands of our wonderful editor in chief, Sharon and all of our fabulous contributors. Thank you, everybody!

Herts Tennis Foundation report 2024

The Herts Tennis Foundation has had another productive year in supporting tennis to grow throughout the county enhancing and developing networks in both education and disability/inclusion. Also supporting a good number of the county's clubs in their work to engage more players from these areas in the community.

Hertfordshire was again leading the way in offering opportunities for disabled people to play tennis and was top of the participation charts in the country. This has been achieved again by the fantastic work done by the growing number of clubs now offering and supporting disabled players to access the game.

There are a few examples below of some of the successes but this is only a snapshot of what is being delivered both through disability-specific sessions and the increased number of club programmes running inclusive sessions that allow disabled participants to enjoy our game.

- Sessions run for St Elizabeths SEND college by the team at Bishop's Stortford and SEND students at Oaklands college run by Batchwood. These were both supported by The Graham Rowlandson Fund. They also support and fund a number of other projects across the county which we are very grateful for.
- Six SEND schools across the county have regular weekly delivery run by Get set 4 tennis, Batchwood, Hertford and Independent tennis. These are supported by the Give It Your Max charity.
 Potters Bar also links and delivers in a number of local SEND schools.
- The continued development of walking tennis offered at a number of clubs including Hoddesdon, Batchwood, Bishop's Stortford and Get Set 4 tennis. We hope to continue to grow this offer in 2025 to more clubs.
- We have had a number of clubs including Hitchin and Letchworth run inclusive school delivery sessions and link these participants back to their junior club sessions very successfully.
- A county project was run to train a number of SEND school

teachers in the LTA youth training and to have follow up festivals for their school pupils. Five new schools are currently engaged.

- Hertfordshire LTA linked with Middlesex LTA to run our first coaches' disability forum which was a huge success with over 20 coaches attending the day. It included guest speakers Jon Wildman and Stuart Wilkinson running on-court sessions.
- Building on the link with Middlesex LTA, a number of Hertfordshire players played in the Para standing and wheelchair county championships run in Middlesex.

As a county we are here to help any club that wants to deliver disability/inclusive tennis sessions and are always happy to talk through ideas, programmes and how we can support. We have a growing number of partners in this area so our network of support is constantly growing.

Within the education area of work the Herts Tennis Foundation team has continued developing its links with the county's School Games network. We were again at the Herts PE conference where we had the chance to promote the LTA Youth Schools teacher training offer with now just over 50% of the county's schools having completed it. We have used these links to help tennis clubs in Hertfordshire build new links with schools and increase their delivery opportunities.

As a county team we were involved in the delivery of the Hertfordshire School Games events both at Oaklands and in the schools' games tennis finals run by the team from Welwyn Tennis Club.

We are also piloting local school festivals and linking with the local SGOs to do this which is an exciting addition to our offer and partnership.

As a team we are here to support any club that wants to make new links with schools or is interested in running local school festivals. Please do get in touch with us to discuss further.

We are looking forward to working with as many clubs as possible across the county this year and supporting in any way needed within schools and Disability/inclusion programmes and projects. Please do get in contact to PYWHerts@gmail.com to talk further with the team.

In Memoriam

A few words about Ann Toogood who died June 4th 2024

Whatever she did, Ann threw herself one hundred percent into it. This was exactly her approach to tennis, whether she was practising, playing matches, captaining teams, organising leagues, volunteering for her club or for Herts Tennis. She absolutely loved tennis.

She was immensely proud to captain St. Albans LTC ladies team in 1978 in their first title win in the Herts League. A remarkable feat as Harpenden won it every other year from 1970 to 1983. She demanded a high standard of loyalty in a team and many of us who played with her will have been influenced by her determination, fairness, kindness and team spirit. She played for Herts in the Summer County Cup in 1979, and several Winter County Cups, always accompanied by team mascot, Sam!

Ann was made a Vice President in 1990 and became Herts Ladies Senior Organiser from 1992 to 2010, a time during which the Herts Senior Winter Ladies League expanded hugely due its success and brilliant organisation by Ann and the committee, chaired by Val Harris.

She always continued to support Herts Tennis and to meet up with ex tennis friends. Ann had a long and distinguished career working for De Beers Diamonds and was the first woman Quality Control Manager. She

2024 Herts Ladies - Summer County Cup Champions for the fifth time in a row!

Herts Ladies Summer County Cup, Eastbourne

We approached County Week 2024 with four successive victories under our belts and aiming for number five (and some better weather than last year).

Day 1 saw us take on Northumberland and with some grey clouds overhead and the potential of rain we got off to a

fantastic start going 3-0 up and winning two close third set tiebreaks in pairs 2 and 3 (Georgie Axon / Hannah Read and Erin Pearce / Marelie Raath). The third round also went according to plan with some strong performances throughout the team to secure a solid 6-3 win over Surrey.

Day 3 On Wednesdays we wear pink. In our pink shirts we took on Yorkshire and again we got off to another great start finishing round 1 of matches 3-0 up. We continued the dominance throughout the day and stormed through Yorkshire 9-0 with clinical performances from the entire team, Hannah Read and Georgie Axon clinching two third set tiebreak victories. With rain expected on Thursday, we decided to play our Thursday match round 1 against Middlesex on Wednesday evening to try and get ahead of

The Herts League: Gosling and Harpenden are our 2024 Champions

Congratulations go to Gosling's Ladies and Harpenden's Men on winning the 2024 Herts League titles.

The contrast in the history of the two clubs couldn't be starker when it comes to success in the competition. This is only the second time that Gosling has been crowned Herts League Champions, whereas their latest title means that Harpenden has now lifted both the Men's and Ladies' shields a staggering 34 times.

Let me put that into a bit of perspective though. The Herts League has been running for well over 70 years and we didn't have a Gosling for most of it! So, while their two titles have come in the last 5 years, Harpenden has had a relatively barren spell since winning their 32nd Men's and last Ladies' titles back in 2007.

Both of our champions had perfect seasons, winning all 6 of their matches, but neither will be resting on their laurels for the forthcoming campaigns. In the Ladies' competition, sitting ominously just below Gosling in the table last year was Letchworth, whose performance in their first year back in the top flight after a spell in the Premier Division was outstanding, with just the one loss to the champions. Herts League buffs will remember that not so very long ago Letchworth were making the Ladies competition their own. Second only to Harpenden in terms of overall titles with 11 – including an incredible run of 10 on the trot between 2008 and 2017 – last year's showing begs the question, are they ready to return to the top? This year will give us a good indication.

Similarly, Harpenden's Men won't be dropping their guard any time soon. Hounded all the way last year by the Welwyn 1st team, winners of 4 of the last 7 titles on offer, they were pushed to the limit in a superb match of extremely high quality on their grass in August. In the end, Harpenden's 5-4 win in that match proved pivotal in the title race.

Barnet and Bishop's Stortford's Men made swift returns to the top flight after the briefest of sojourns in Division 1 and with



Elliswick, Gosling and Rickmansworth all starting to look like they belong at that level, this season promises to be one of the most exciting for years.

Top-class tennis from Ivan Rodriguez Deb

2024 was quite a year for 19 year-old Ivan Rodriguez Deb, a young visually-impaired tennis player from Watford who has held the number 1 spot in Great Britain since the age of 14.

It's a position he cherishes, never takes for granted and never gets used to. Each time he goes on court, he says it's "like a clean sheet". If you ever watch him train at West Herts Tennis Club or David Lloyd Northwood, or play at any of the regional tournaments around the country, you will see a quiet-mannered young man, totally focused on the job in hand, no different to any of the better-known household names that you might have watched on the tennis tours over the years. He shares their focus, discipline, good sportsmanship, talent and essentially winner mentality. If it wasn't for the slightly larger adapted ball that essentially enables him to track it better and compensates for his low vision, you would think he was playing conventional tennis. You wouldn't think "this is a disabled national champion". You would think "this is a national champion". You won't be able to identify him on court by a white cane or a cute guide dog who might divert your attention and which, although act as indispensable tools for many visually impaired people in daily life off court, often detract from matter being fought out on court - top-class tennis.

Top-class tennis is exactly what Ivan delivered once again in 2024. The culmination of his tennis career (albeit unpaid unlike able-bodied and wheelchair tennis players) was winning the Wimbledon Visually Impaired Tennis Finals without dropping a game. As Ivan put it, "receiving the singles winner's trophy at the world's most prestigious tennis club is every tennis player's dream". It goes without saying that he intends to return this summer to try to repeat last year's victory. Three months later saw the National Finals where he won for the fifth consecutive year in lighting conditions that proved to be his biggest challenge and that of many of the other players who competed there.

Ivan was also selected for the LTA's GB squad to represent

Great Britain at the World Blind Tennis Championships in Italy last year, organised by the International Blind Tennis Association. This was a privilege he felt forced to decline as he considered that the poor conditions in which the players were being forced by the organisers to stay and play in were unsatisfactory and would not enable him to play at the level expected of him. He was unfortunately not mistaken given that the medal count for GB last year in Italy was one bronze medal compared with 14 medals (of which Ivan won two) at the World Blind Games in Birmingham in 2023. "With holding a top spot comes the responsibility of trying to make the sport better as a whole and pushing for equality if anything is to change. This also comes with a risk but it's a risk I'm willing to take because for me, it's always been about playing and competing in tennis on the same

level playing field currently enjoyed by able-bodied players and wheelchair players. Herts Tennis and West Herts and Watford Tennis Club have managed to do this and I am incredibly grateful for their support. They have shown that supporting and including a national-level visually-impaired tennis player is no different to supporting any other national-level player." says Ivan.

Besides Wimbledon, this year Ivan hopes to win the Nationals for the sixth consecutive time and represent Great Britain internationally if the opportunity arises. Let's hope this year's "clean sheet" is full of continued success.

Visually impaired tennis is very similar to traditional tennis except that the court is slightly smaller and an adapted ball is used.




